Kailua Beach cleanup Saturday

Effort to extend along shore to Hanauma Bay

Members of the East Oʻahu Lifeguard Association are looking for volunteers for their upcoming cleanup at Kailua Beach, this Saturday from 3 to 5 p.m. According to EʻOLA mem-

ber Suzanne Frazer, the group organizes regular monthly beach cleanups in the area from Hanauma Bay to Kailua in order to clean-up marine debris. The association is composed of both lifeguards and community members.

"The beach cleanups help

raise awareness of the need to protect the ocean and environment from marine debris which can cause strangulation and death of marine animals and birds," she says. "The July cleanup at Bellows Beach produced more than 210 bags of marine debris, trash and drift-

wood."

Frazer says that the group will hold a prize drawing at the end of the cleanup. Volunteers will have the chance to win prizes from a number of sponsors including Kale's Natural Foods, Ben & Jerry's and Jamba Juice. Bags, gloves and water will be provided, she adds.
